### Imprecatory Psalms (2<sup>nd</sup> week)

We are going to continue to consider the Psalms that we started last week: Psalms 35, 58, 72, 83, 94, and 109.

If you didn't get to do the homework last week, read the six Psalms above with these two questions in mind: What's going on in these psalms? What's going on in *you* when you read these psalms?

1. What stood out to you most from Trevor's teaching this week?
2. Has your perspective of these Psalms changed, and if so, how?
3. Which of these Psalms do you find the most difficult to understand? What troubles you the most about that particular Psalm?
4. Which of these Psalms do you find the easiest to relate to? Why?

5. Consider the word “enemies” in a general sense. What makes someone an enemy?

6. What do these verses say about our response to enemies?

a. Matthew 5:43-45

b. Romans 12:17-21

c. Proverbs 24:17

d. Proverbs 20:22

7. What thoughts do you have as you compare the verses above with the Imprecatory Psalms and what you have learned of them so far?

8. Read 1 Peter 5:8-9 and Ephesians 6:18. Who is our ultimate enemy, and what do these verses teach us about battling him?
